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BLACK BOX

In an airplane or helicopter, the flight recorder records the conversation of the pilots and also logs information about controls and sensors. If an accident happens, investigators can use the recordings to assist in the investigation.

In his childhood, Carlos Cortes was brought up as a Catholic. Sitting in churches, bored by the sermon, he would escape to other places through the numerous paintings and sculptures that decorate every church in Spain. Gold, blood, body parts, crucifixions and ecstasy...

These early religious experiences are reflected in his interest in altarpieces. The spiritual value of an object inspiring devotion is combined with an exciting setting: painting and sculpture in a dynamic dialogue with architecture and the congregation.

Carlos Cortes' paintings have always been a form of storytelling. Whether it's directly, through long titles that add a different contemplative dimension to the images or through the characters themselves. They speak to us with strange and colourful outfits and outlandish scenarios. But these are not real characters - they're rather figures that represent ideas - ambassadors of symbolic worlds.

Carlos' pictorial tales share a common background with other storytellers like Edward Hopper and Piero de la Francesca. They are quiet tableaux where space and allegorical characters conjugate layers of information and often conflicting narratives. Their static presence is pregnant with hidden drama. Like the silence of the volcano - the hot magma always there under many layers of rock. Unseen and unstable. A force that may erupt at some point in time. Big Bang! Pompeii. Buried under the ashes.

It is only recently after many years of painting that Carlos realized that his creative work has always functioned as a kind of tracking device. His long quest for healing began when as a teenager he experienced the traumatic loss of his beloved brother. His journey thereafter criss-crossing the landscape of his life.

When your soul becomes a wreck you have to find a way of putting the pieces together. You probably look for other survivors or you try and trace the marks left by accidents and events that shaped things around you.

In the end, you are always trying to find 'The Black Box'. - Cortes

Most of Carlos' paintings act as recordings of muted conversations, tracking the underlying forces that shape our lives and inform our decision making process.

Buried in our unconscious, are secret voices that we very rarely are able to hear. These paintings go a long way in revealing some of those last minutes before the silence of reality spreads its wings again.

There is also a performing, interacting element, present in many of his works. These black boxes demand something from the spectator: they have a double life as wooden 3D sculptures, and as 2D paintings. Their doors are made of fragments of other people's lives, bits of furniture, door and window frames, flooring boards...some smashed, torn or broken. Accidents, scratches, dents, recordings of everyday dramas that continue their journey by becoming part of an artwork. Doors that reveal hidden truths. A secret window to another space which can be opened or closed.

Quiet and introspective characters that ask you, the viewer to decide. You can watch or you can hide. You can keep it to yourself or you can share it with others. They move when you move or speak to you when you want, often causing one to smile. These are dancing paintings, that interact with the environment in a playful architectural game.

Despite everything, the work always has humour. They also tend to be small artworks to allow one to travel with them. A little suitcase. You can play again, make the same choices, just somewhere else.

Their images will not leave you.










